


Log Cabin

The log cabin was located on part of the John R. Jones League that was granted by the Mexican Government in 1831. The cabin was built between 1881—1886 on the John R. Jones League south of Round Top on Willow Springs Road. The cabin was a gift to the Round Top Area Historical Society by Reese and Darla Schmidt in 2003.










Noak House

The Noak Farmhouse was built in the early 1900s, three miles southeast of Round Top, partly constructed with rooms from the Giese Farmhouse in the area. Willie and Irene Giese Noak married in 1920 and had six children, all of whom were born and raised in this house.





Kraus House

Fredrich William Kraus emigrated from Germany in 1844, landing as Galveston. In 1847, the same year he married Dorothea Koenig, he purchased land a few miles east of where Round Top had its beginning. Here they farmed and raised cattle, living in a log house and rearing five children: Emma, Louise, Fredrich W., Jr., Otto, and Adolph.

Points of interest about the house; The outside structure of the house is know as "board" and "bat" construction. Twelve inch horizontal boards with bats covered the opening between the boards.
